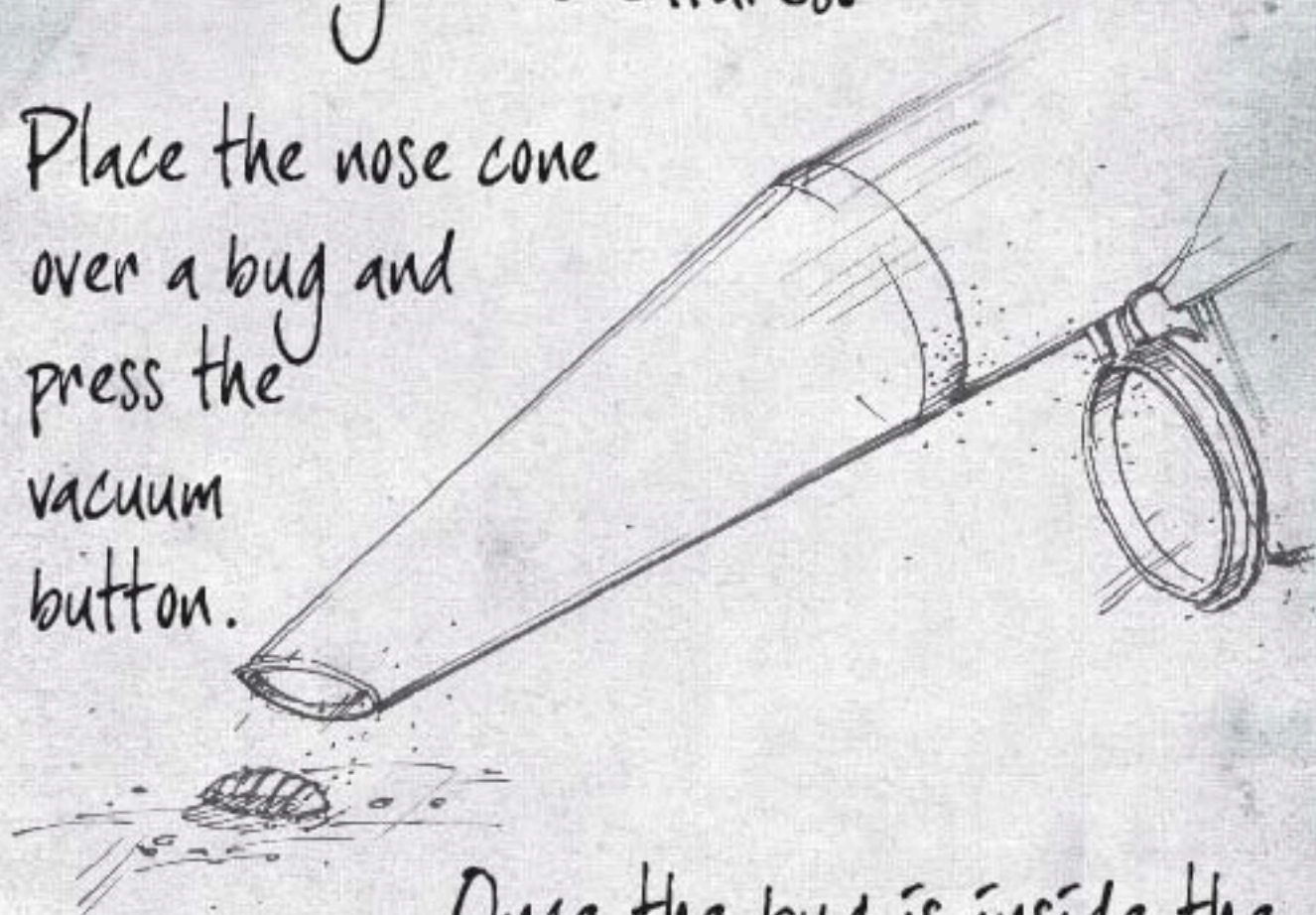
# CRITTER CATCHER BUG VAC™

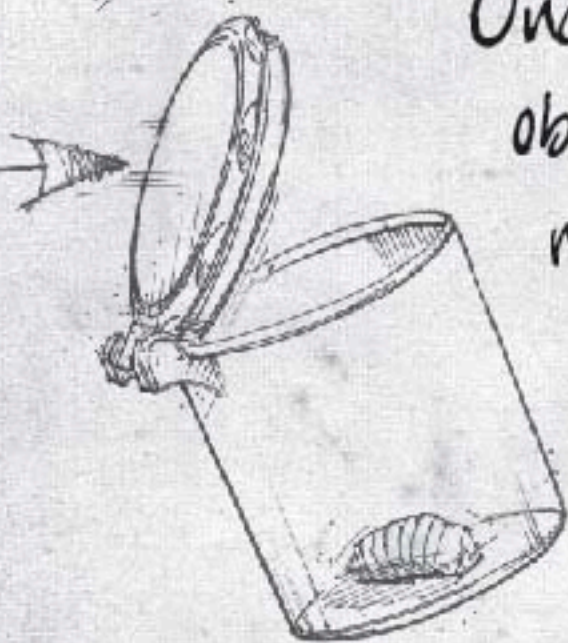


Always use extreme care when collecting and observing live creatures.

Place the nose cone over a bug and press the vacuum button.



Once the bug is inside the observation chamber, remove the observation chamber and immediately flip the magnifier cap closed.



Don't forget to release the bug back into the wild.



**CAUTION:**

Do not look directly at the sun.  
Do not leave in direct sunlight due to the risk of fire from magnifying glasses.



# My Fellow Explorer,

Collecting bugs and other insects in the field can be extremely challenging, and getting up close to observe them can be even more so.

The Critter Catcher Bug Vac tackles both of these problems. The powerful suction makes collecting all kinds of critters easy and fun. The removable viewing chamber comes with a built-in magnifier, so you can see what you collected up close, in great detail.

Don't forget, as fun as it is to collect and observe insects, it's important to return them to their natural environment when you are done observing them!

## Beat The Clock

Give yourself 20 minutes to go on a mission to find, collect, and observe as many bugs as possible. How many critters did you collect? How many different kinds? Be sure to release the bugs safely back into their habitats after observing them.

As you go on your critter-collecting journeys, keep a log of everything you find. Then, find a good insect-identification website or book, and learn more about your discoveries!



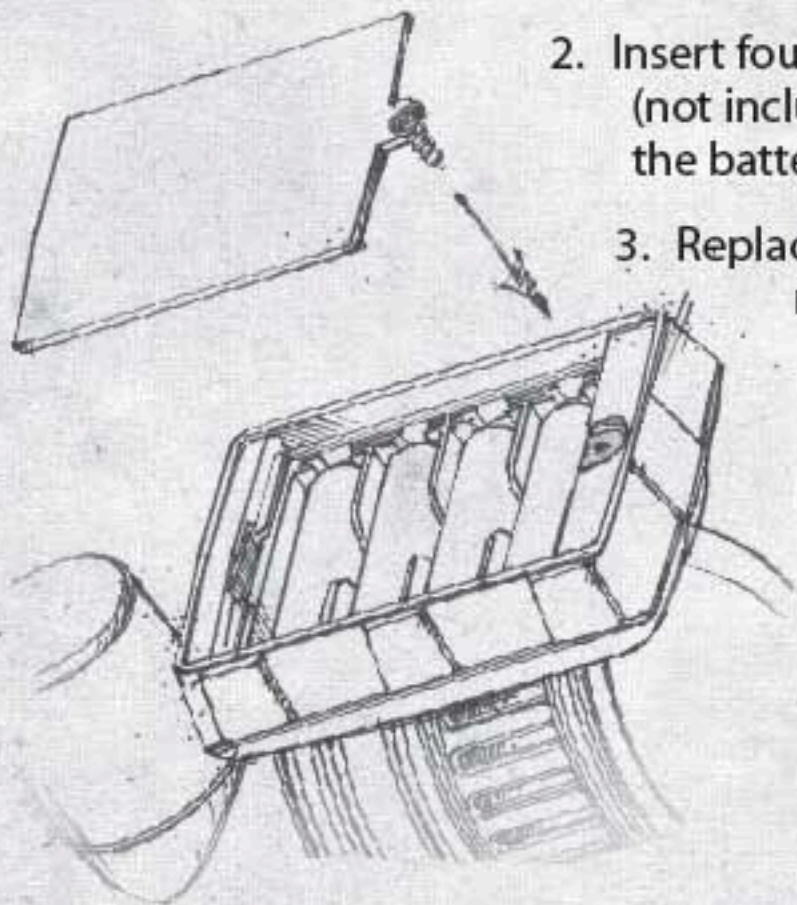
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## Battery Installation

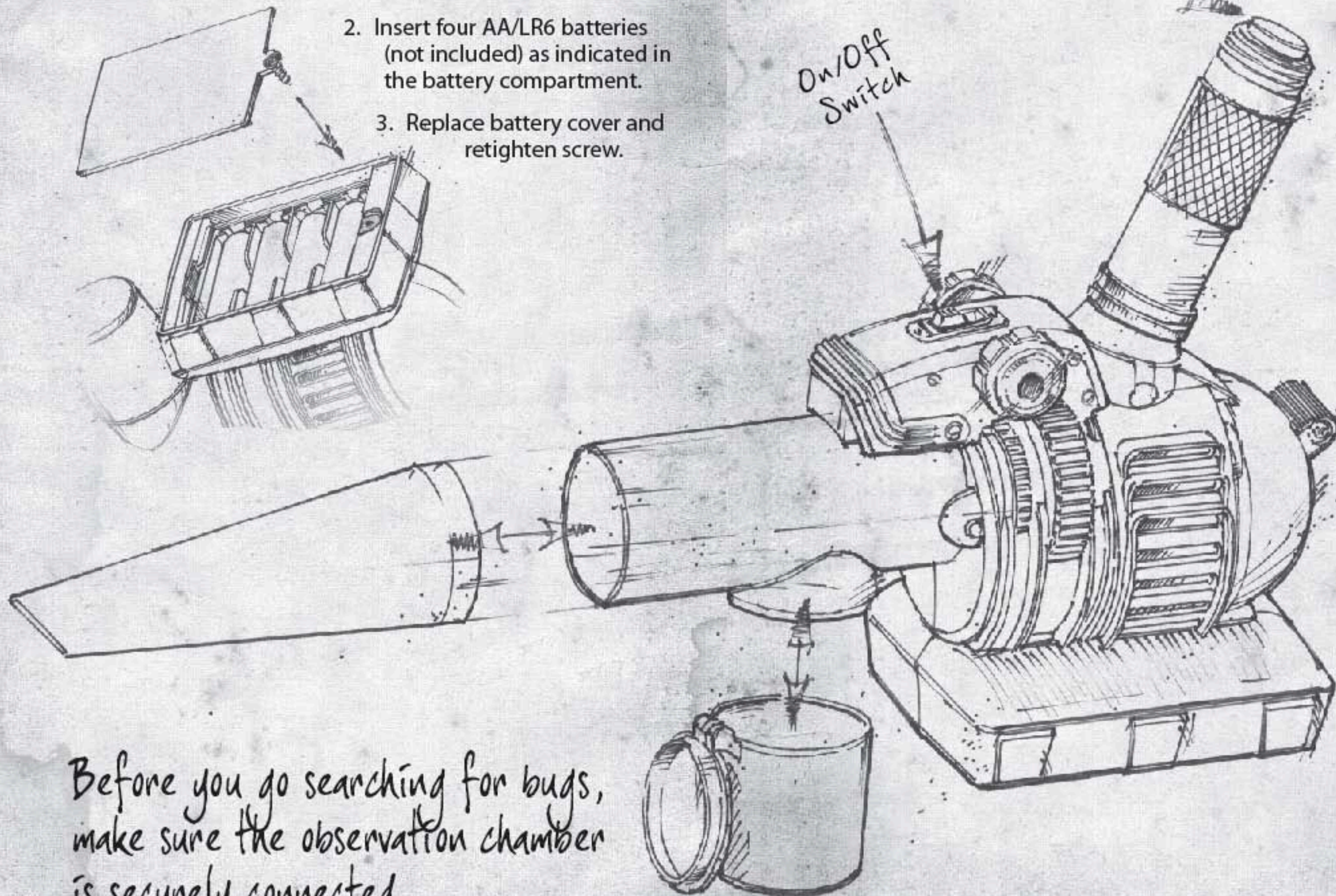
Requires a small Phillips-head screwdriver.

1. Using a Phillips-head screwdriver, loosen the screw in the battery cover, and remove the battery cover as shown.



2. Insert four AA/LR6 batteries (not included) as indicated in the battery compartment.

3. Replace battery cover and retighten screw.



Before you go searching for bugs, make sure the observation chamber is securely connected.

#### BATTERY SAFETY INFORMATION

- Non-rechargeable batteries are not to be recharged.
- Rechargeable batteries are to be removed from the toy before being charged.
- Rechargeable batteries are only to be charged under adult supervision.
- Different types of batteries or new and used batteries are not to be mixed.
- Batteries are to be inserted with the correct polarity.
- Exhausted batteries are to be removed from the toy.
- The supply terminals are not to be short-circuited.
- Do not mix old and new batteries.
- Do not mix alkaline, standard (carbon-zinc), or rechargeable (nickel-cadmium) batteries.
- Do not dispose of batteries in fire. Batteries may explode or leak.
