- 2. When you reveal a piece of bone, dig completely around it to avoid damage to the part. Use the excavation brush to dust off the loose material.
- 3. Clean off each dinosaur bone segment carefully with a damp cloth.
- 4. Refer to the diagram and use your skill to carefully assemble your bones and reconstruct an amazing dinosaur skeleton.


